

St. Francis Xavier was born on April 7, 1506, in the town of Xavier, Spain, as the third son of the president of the Council of the king of Navarre. Growing up in Xavier, he received his early education there until 1525. Subsequently, he journeyed to the University of Paris, the theological center of Europe, for further studies, where he encountered St. Ignatius of Loyola, ultimately becoming his close friend.

Inspired by St. Ignatius Loyola's words, "What shall it profit a man if he gain the whole world and lose his own soul?," St. Francis Xavier meditated on these words and decided to dedicate himself to God's mission. He joined St. Ignatius Loyola in proclaiming the kingdom of God and became one of the first seven Jesuits to take vows of poverty and chastity at Montmartre,





Paris, in 1534. Francis Xavier was ordained as a priest on June 24, 1537.

St. Francis Xavier played a pivotal role in the spread of Christianity in India. He traveled to India, where he tirelessly proclaimed the Good News and converted thousands of people. Through his efforts, many were baptized, and he taught the principles of Christianity through small catechisms in simple language.

In 1548, Francis Xavier returned to India, where more Jesuits had joined him in Goa. The College of Holy Faith, founded earlier, was turned over to the Jesuits, and Francis worked to develop it into a center for the education of native priests and catechists for the diocese of Goa, stretching from the Cape of Good Hope to China. The area he evangelized in India has remained Catholic to the present day. Remarkably, the body of St. Francis Xavier, which defied the laws of nature by not decomposing, rests in a silver casket in the Church of Bom Jesus Basilica in Goa. This miraculous preservation has continued to the present day.

St. Francis Xavier was beatified by Pope Paul V on October 25, 1619, and canonized by Pope Gregory XV on March 12, 1622. Additionally, the right hand of St. Francis Xavier, cut and sent to Rome as a relic, was considered evidence of his sanctity by the Church.

Foremost is the right to be free from slavery, a fundamental principle asserting that no one should be coerced into actions against their will. Slavery, with its history marred by dehumanization and cruelty, was a focal point of the American Civil War, which aimed to abolish this practice. Today, thanks to the Universal Declaration of Human Rights, slavery has been outlawed in most countries, exemplifying the enduring commitment to upholding this essential human right.

The second crucial human right is the right to education. Recognizing the transformative power of

knowledge, societies worldwide acknowledge the importance of providing education as a basic right. Education serves as a catalyst for success, empowering individuals and ensuring a more prosperous future for generations to come. The belief is that a well-educated society is better equipped to navigate challenges and contribute positively to the world.

The third vital human right emphasizes ownership — the right to one's possessions. This right underscores the principle that individuals, through their hard work and endeavors, have the autonomy to claim ownership of their belongings. Whether earned through employment or other means, the right to personal property safeguards the notion that what one has acquired is exclusively theirs. This principle fosters a sense of security and autonomy, affirming an individual's right to assert ownership over their possessions.


In conclusion, the Universal Declaration of Human Rights stands as a testament to humanity's collective commitment to fostering dignity and equality.




- Annually, on December 4th, India commemorates Navy Day, acknowledging the pivotal role of the Indian Navy.

NATIONAL POLLUTION CONTROL DAY 2ND DECEMBER





Every year, on the solemn occasion of December 2nd, India observes National Pollution Control Day, a day of remembrance and reflection. The significance of this day is deeply rooted in the tragic events of December 3, 1984, known as the Bhopal gas tragedy, one of the most devastating man-made disasters in history.

The Bhopal gas tragedy unfolded as a nightmarish event, shattering the lives of thousands as a poisonous gas, methyl isocyanate, leaked from a tank within the pesticide production unit of Union Carbide India Limited. The incident had catastrophic consequences, affecting millions of lives and leaving an indelible mark on the collective consciousness of the nation.

On that fateful night, the gas silently permeated the air, escaping into the nearby residential areas within hours. The unsuspecting residents, caught in their sleep, found themselves engulfed in a toxic cloud that swiftly choked the air, leading to tragic and untimely deaths for those who could not escape in time.
